

## From DG Dick Cuttle...

The nominating committee for DG 2012-13 has met and resolved to nominate Rotarian Roy Armstrong, PP Rotary Club of Marion, and AG Group 6, for the position of DG 2012-13.

Some of you may remember that some time ago we had a guest speaker, Dario Schwörer, from the TOPtoTOP Global Climate Expedition. Dario, his wife Sabine and their three children (all born on the voyage) are travelling around the world, climbing the seven great summits of the world and 7-Summits non-stop round-the-world sailing the seven seas by human power and nature's force sailing the seven seas by human power and nature's force. The expedition has been underway

for seven years, travelling from the highest peak in Switzerland to the highest summit in the world, Mt Everest. The Expedition has already sailed through the Seven Oceans of the world on the sailing ship Pachamama (Earth Mother). The family travels by bike and on foot. Baby Noë was born in Darwin, and has had some health concerns. Noë was repatriated to Switzerland at the end of last November for kidney surgery. He and Sabine are now back with Dario, Andri and Salina

**The TOPtoTOP Expedition** is currently in Nepal, doing a clean up of Mt Everest. Since the Expedition started in Switzerland in 2002, the Expedition has visited 45,000 students in 47 different countries and participants have collected a total of 20,000kg of rubbish along the way. While they are in Nepal, Dario will climb Mt Everest while Sabine and the children will spend their time in a small village at 3800m above sea level. Sabine, a nurse, will volunteer at the local hospital. Dario also plans to manage the recovery of the body of an unfortunate climber who passed away on Mt Everest.

Dario is also trying to establish a concept for the management and transport logistics of collected waste, so that potential recycling programs can be tried. The concept so far is that the Sherpas who are paid to carry the excess luggage of the climbers up the mountain, no longer come back down the mountain empty handed. Instead, they will bring with them labelled and numbered rubbish sacks. The money given to the Sherpas may be a cost that is added to the permits of the National Park, which trekkers will finance. In Juri the rubbish will be taken to a yet-to -be-established recycling station to be sorted. In early June, TOPtoTOP will visit the schools in Kathmandu, before continuing the expedition towards China and the World Exhibition in Shanghai.
